The Presidential Scholars in the arts were chosen for their commitment, artistic achievements, passion, growth, pursuit of artistic goals, and overall excellence.

Honorable Mention

Kaeleb Berthiaume (North Country Union High School)

Kaeleb is a remarkable individual whose exceptional self-awareness and exemplary leadership make him a standout student in the arts. Throughout his high school journey, he has demonstrated an unparalleled ability to contribute creatively to his school community. Serving as co-captain for the NCUHS Dance Company for three years, Kaeleb exhibits strong leadership in the dance classroom, treating everyone with kindness and respect. Beyond school, he not only attends but also teaches classes at a local dance studio. Notably, during his sophomore year, Kaeleb initiated Teen and Adaptive Dance classes, showcasing his commitment to inclusivity and mentorship. As a versatile artist, he excels as a dancer, actor, and musician, always eager to expand his skills. Kaeleb's initiative goes beyond performance – he co-founded the first Spring Cabaret at his school, demonstrating his organizational prowess and dedication to promoting the performing arts. He extends his passion for arts education by hosting productions and fundraisers, such as a dance recital benefiting a local family dealing with a rare disease. Kaeleb's positivity, energy, and advocacy for others create an inspiring atmosphere. Career Technical Education (CTE)

This year there are five Career Technical Education (CTE) Presidential Scholars and two Honorable Mentions. These students were chosen from 22 nominations from CTE centers and programs across the state. All the nominees showed examples of these important qualities and reflect the drive, ingenuity, and dedication of CTE students across the state of Vermont. CTE Presidential Scholars were chosen based on their ingenuity, creativity and problem-solving; employability skills; technical competence; and academic rigor.

Honorable Mention

Cooper Joseph Hodgeman (North Country Career Center)

Through diligent work in his CTE program, Cooper is on track to pass the Siemens Mechatronic Systems Certification Exam in the spring. He earned a Platinum level National Career Readiness Certificate. Through Dual Enrollment at North Country Union High School, Cooper earned six college credits through CCV. Cooper plans to attend a top-rated engineering school after he graduates. Cooper was elected as Skills USA Treasurer and in the Additive Manufacturing competition he and his teammate won silver. He serves as the North Country Career Center representative of the student body at school board meetings. He is a member of the robotics club, varsity soccer team, STEM Academy, National Honor Society and volunteers with ENCORE after-school program mentoring elementary students. Cooper pushes his knowledge in the STEM field and works to contribute to his community and the world. He has participated in challenging summer opportunities through an advanced engineering camp at Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Georgia, and a Galapagos Islands Field Study, raising funds to be able to travel to Ecuador to study ecosystems and culture, carrying out an independent research project on fish and their ecosystems, and building an aquarium environment to study tilapia.

Elizabeth Vaughan (River Bend Career and Technical Center)

She wants to find a career in Agriculture and is interested in post-secondary education that will help her succeed in that goal. She is a member of 4-H and spends time working on her family dairy farm, babysitting, working for another local farm, and working at the local Agway store.

Ayowunmi Phoebe Adewayi (Burlington Technical Center)

Ayowunmi successfully completed prerequisite coursework over the summer in order to join Burlington Technical Center's Health Science Academy as a second-year student. She is taking the program at the more rigorous Honors level and will complete the program with college credit in Anatomy and Physiology II through Vermont State University. She will be eligible to sit for the National Healthcareer Association (NHA) Phlebotomy certification in the spring and is an active member of HOSA Future Health Professionals. Ayowunmi is deeply engaged in her community. She is in the Diversity Club and was active in the Black Student Union at her former school. She is also a member of The Society of Torch & Laurel and the National Academy of Future Physicians and Medical Scientists. Ayowunmi volunteers at the Human Society and as a kids' leader in her church. She is deeply committed to learning about other cultures and history as well as providing a welcoming space for people to celebrate their unique backgrounds.

Emma Cosgrove (Stafford Technical Center)

Emma is on track to earn 12 college credits in her CTE center program through NHTI in courses including Engineering Principles and Computer Integrated Manufacturing. She has earned the Lean 101 credential and is on track to earn the Autodesk Fusion 360 Certified User and Certified Manufacturing Associate credentials. Emma earned the National Career Readiness Certificate at the Platinum level. She is a member of the National Technical Honor Society, National Honor Society, and the National Spanish Honor Society. Emma is actively involved with SkillsUSA and received a Silver Medal at the State-level Automated Manufacturing competition. She also competed with FIRST Robotics, where her team qualified for and competed at the world level. For her CTE program's capstone project, she is partnering with NASA engineers to design and manufacture a self-contained biome that could be used for efficient food production in urban, remote, or even extra-terrestrial locations. Emma also works as a hostess at the Killington Distillery, volunteers with Partners for Prevention / Vermont After School and at the Rutland VT MINT makerspace and, is a member of Rutland High School's Art Club and Varsity Field Hockey team.

Kennedy Desaultels (Burlington Technical Center)

Through the Health Sciences Academy, Kennedy is attaining ten college credits in courses including Human Biology, Introduction to Healthcare and Medical Terminology, in addition to pursuing Dual Enrollment coursework opportunities through her high school, CVU. She will sit for the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) certification exam in the spring, is planning to pursue further education to become a physician and is especially interested in neuroscience. Kennedy is a member of the National Technical Honor Society and earned a Gold level National Career Readiness Certificate. She serves as a state officer for HOSA Future Health Professionals and was a voting delegate at the International Leadership Conference in Dallas, TX and plans to continue her active involvement in college. Kennedy volunteers with Girls on the Run and is a member of CVU's environmental action club, CVU Enact.

Luca Karki (Center for Technology, Essex)

Luca is on track to graduate from high school having earned 23 college credits, ranging from program-focused courses like Burls to Boards and Wildlife Ecology, to Sociology and Precalculus. Luca has successfully completed levels 1 – 4 of the Game of Logging, a postsecondary credential focused on chainsaw safety, productivity, conservation and cutting techniques. He has also earned the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) Core and Heavy Equipment Level 1 certifications, as well as the National Career Readiness Certificate at the Gold level. Luca's plan is to attend a four-year university studying forest management with the goal of becoming a game warden. He is a member of the National Honor Society and National Technical Honor Society. In the state's Science Olympiad competition, Luca won a bronze medal in forestry. He is now participating in a CTE work-based learning paid internship with Shelburne Farms where he is an assistant forester working on combatting and uprooting invasive species to protect baby maple trees. Luca is greatly engaged in his community participating in his high school's Social Justice Union, volunteering with the history board for Essex



Westford School District, working with The Growing Peace Project, and getting involved with David Zuckerman's campaign. He has worked in many agricultural jobs including Paul Mazza's Farm, Vermont Youth Conservation Corps as a farm worker, and Audubon Vermont as a junior conservation technician.

Angkith Pradhan (Center for Technology, Essex)

Angkith has been solving "real-world" problems since day one in his Mechanical Engineering program, developing digital concepts for working machines and then actually creating them, from bottle openers, to reverse engineering a robotic arm. He seeks out opportunities for engineering at every turn, including summer programs at the Governor's Institute of Vermont for Engineering and the Wentworth Institute of Technology pre-college program Impact-Lab, for which he raised funds from sponsors in order to participate. Angkith has earned six college credits from Vermont State University in Design Communication and Introduction to Chemistry and earned the National Career Readiness Certificate at the Gold level. He is a member of the National Honor Society and National Technical Honor Society and participates in SkillsUSA for Additive Manufacturing. Angkith has passed the Certified SolidWorks Associate (CSWA) exam, will sit for the Certified SolidWorks Professional (CSWP) exam, and will have opportunities to go out on career work experiences with local engineering firms. Angkith is dedicated to his community, volunteering with homework club in the library after school and coaching adaptive soccer to children through a program called TOPSoccer, hosted by the Vermont Soccer Association. He takes an active leadership role in the Multilingual Affinity Group at Center for Technology Essex and plays on the Essex High School soccer team.

General

The Presidential Scholars General category recognizes students for their contributions to school and community; citizenship; academic achievements, including traditional and non-traditional learning experiences; creativity and innovation in learning; leadership; and being an inspiration to others. Winners in this category are invited to apply to be National Presidential Scholars, a selection process through the US Department of Education.

Presidential Scholars: General

Christopher Alfano (Burr and Burton Academy)

Christopher has been active in BBA's Student Council for 4 years, working his way up to the office of President; he is currently planning town hall meetings to allow students to engage directly with their state representatives. Selected by the faculty as a Mentor to a 9th-grade advisory, Chris meets with his group twice a week and creates programming to support them. He also serves as a BBA Ambassador, touring visitors and helping transition new students during Orientation programming. Last year, Chris founded a school-based Unicef Chapter to increase awareness about global humanitarian issues. Chris serves as the Junior Board member of a local charity, Be Brave For Life. He organizes volunteer meetings to plan fundraisers for benign brain tumor research. In the past two years, he helped organize and run events that have raised \$35,000 for research. Chris also plays Varsity Lacrosse and is a member of BBA's Student Athletic Leadership Team. He is currently a National Merit Semi-Finalist and he was recently selected as one of two Vermont representatives to the United States Senate Youth Program this coming spring. A winning Debate and Model UN competitor, Chris was selected to participate in an all-expense paid summer program hosted at Georgetown (Civics Unplugged). He was selected for a research internship with local state representative, Mike Rice. He conceived, created, and is now marketing a free app (Civicly) to make civics education more accessible.



Sarah Ali (Burlington High School)

Sarah is a Counselor-in-Training for the Boys and Girls Club where she assists counselors and works with the kindergarten and first grade students in planning activities, being an effective role model, and developing leadership skills. In this role, Sarah has earned multiple certifications through the American Red Cross: CPR, AED, Epinephrine Injection, and First Aid. Boys and Girls Club has also helped her build her skill set in communication and advocacy for herself, her community, and for others. Last spring, she was awarded Burlington Youth of the year as well as Vermont Youth of the Year. On top of her BGC work, Sarah participates in UVM Upward Bound which includes college prep classes and weekly advisory. During the summer she participates in it's six-week summer college program and completes volunteer work, such as painting murals and working as a pool spotter at the Boys and Girls Club. In addition to her strong academics and intense pursuit and focus on her education, Sarah is also a talented photographer. Last fall Sarah received two awards for her photography: third place from the Center for Whole Communities, a photo environmental justice competition documenting the issue of waste in her neighborhood, and a Silver Key from the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards for a portrait. Sarah's work was on display at the Brattleboro Museum of Art and Culture with the other Scholastic winners.

Matthew Califano (Craftsbury Academy)

Matthew has given his time as a Teacher's Assistant in English and math courses, volunteered as a mentor for AmeriCorps's DREAM program, and worked as a Leader-in-Training with the Vermont Institute of Natural Science. He also serves on AmeriCorps's Vermont Advisory Board. He is Treasurer for his class at Craftsbury Academy, and a student representative to the OSSU Steering Committee where he is working to build student and parent engagement in our educational system. He has received the Youth Citizenship Award from the local DAR chapter, the Citizen-Scholar Book Award from UVM, and the Book Award for Academic Achievement and Social Conscience from St. Michael's College. Because of his service, he has also received the Congressional Award's Silver Medal and President's Volunteer Service Award Gold Medal twice. Matthew was named a College Board AP Scholar with Distinction, a College Board National Hispanic Scholar, a National Rural and Small Town Scholar, and a National Merit Semifinalist. Matthew authored a full-length play for which he won the Dorset Theatre Festival's Jean E. Miller Prize. Matthew was Vermont's sole winner in the 2023 National Council of Teachers of English Achievement Awards in Writing, winning First Class Distinction, and won the Lillie B. Hamilton Award. The Calvin Coolidge Presidential Foundation inducted him as a Coolidge Scholar this past summer. Every year, the Foundation selects five or fewer truly exceptional young Americans as Coolidge Scholars out of over 4,300 applicants nationwide. The Coolidge Scholarship is the only full-ride merit scholarship in America.

Maura Connelly (Middlebury Union High School)

Maura is involved in Middlebury's Environmental Club and Art Club, and works at East View, a local community residence for senior citizens, as a server in the dining room. She is Peer Leader at MUHS, helping 9th graders transition from middle to high school at the onset of the academic year, a weekly commitment that lasts for the entire first quarter. She is Co-President of the school's Human Rights Club and is currently doing a drive for the local shelter in Middlebury. She has also organized events for Migrant Justice. Maura is pursuing the most academically challenging program at MUHS, the International Baccalaureate Diploma, and has consistently shown excellent time management skills and independent study habits that have highlighted her abilities as a stellar student. Her 4.04 GPA puts her at the top of her class. She traveled to Ecuador last year with the school as part of an immersion trip to further delve into her study of the Spanish language. She has also served as a Peer Leader at MUHS during her senior year, an honor position at the school where students are chosen by the faculty and administration.

Hannah Cunningham (Rice Memorial High School)

Hannah was elected class President her Junior and Senior years after serving as the class Vice President her Freshman and Sophomore years. She has been an Orientation Leader each year and is the captain of her very competitive field hockey team. Hannah was appointed by the Burlington Mayor's office to and is an



active member of the City Board of Health, where she led the work on a plan for safe syringe disposal for the residents of Burlington. She is a Junior Facilitator for the Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Conference (HOBY). Hannah has also been a long-time volunteer each month making and serving meals at the local Salvation Army and will be starting another program where she will be making and delivering food to individuals and families in the downtown Burlington area. Hannah has been recognized by AmeriCorps with the Presidential Service Silver Medal. She has achieved a 101.9 GPA and is an AP Scholar with Distinction. Hannah founded The Knights Banner, the Rice student newspaper. Since the founding of The Banner, Hannah was selected as the Vermont representative to the Al Neuharth National Free Spirit and Journalism Conference in Washington D.C. She is also now a student editor for the VT Digger. She was selected to the Emerging Rural Leadership Program at the University of Chicago, won the Manfred Hummel Award for the best junior year paper at Rice Memorial, the Clarkson University Leadership Award, the Quill and Scroll Journalism Honors Society Award and the St. Johnsbury Academy Model U.N. Outstanding Delegate Award.

Nadja Douoning (Winooski Middle High School)

Nadja is a drummer and percussionist in the Winooski High School Jazz Band. Nadja began making music on her cell phone at age 12. She began playing the drums at age 15 when she moved to Vermont two years ago. Locally, Nadja has shared her music at poetry venues, during Community Gatherings at her high school, for special events at the Flynn Theater, and for statewide events sponsored by the Vermont Humanities Council, Clemmons Family Farm, and Junction Arts and Media (White River Junction, VT). Nationally, she received a scholarship to attend Berklee 5-Week ASPIRE Summer Music Program in Boston, Massachusetts. Nadja brought what she learned at Berklee back to Winooski with the goal of being a better musician and sharing her knowledge with others. Internationally, Nadja has traveled to Europe and Africa, most recently to Ivory Coast where she learned the history of the Bètè peoples and witnessed the AANIKA Professional Dance and Drumming Artists in a tribute performance for her father, a former member of the National Ballet of Ivory Coast and the Ki-Yi M'Bock Artist Colony.

Baxter Harrington (Middlebury Union High School)

Baxter is a member of Team USA and participated in the Youth Skyrunning World Championships in the summer of 2023 in Italy. He was chosen as one of three student Peer Leader Coordinators to oversee the programming that welcomes MUHS's newly enrolling ninth graders as they transition from middle to high school. He captains the Cross Country team, is a member of the Nordic ski team and was last year's Northern Vermont Athletic Conference Small School Individual Champion. Baxter works part time at a local restaurant washing dishes and has also served part time as a janitor at a local elementary school. He still finds time to volunteer with his town's Fire and Rescue squad. He is a candidate for the full International Baccalaureate Diploma, MUHS's most demanding curriculum, and his GPA is one of the highest in his class (3.92). He has been recognized by the College Board as a National Rural and Small Town Scholar and is a recipient of the American Legion's award in Fine Arts, Design and Mathematics. He has participated in the Vermont Governor's Institute in Mathematics.

Lily Hutcheson (Burr and Burton Academy)

Currently, Lily serves as a New Student Mentor and Communications Director of student council. She also volunteers at the Writing Center and serves as co-captain of the Speech and Debate team. She is most proud of her work and leadership efforts in BBA's arts department, where she works as a writer, director, and executive producer of our annual New Works One Act Theater Festival. Lily has served as a Community Leader for the Vermont Young Writers Project. Last summer, she attended two prestigious writing programs – lowa and Sewanee. Lily wrote, produced, directed, and edited a short mockumentary-style film called "Mr. Collins and the Zombies of Gloucestershire." It was awarded third place by the Jane Austen Society of North America's national competition for young filmmakers. She has participated in the Poetry Out Loud Competition every year of high school and was a state finalist twice. She has been selected as a National Poets Program Semifinalist, a National Semifinalist in the Eugene O'Neill Young Playwrights Festival, a National Semifinalist in The Blank Theater Young Playwrights Festival, the winner of The Weston Theater Spring Playwrights Festival. She has been awarded Gold and Silver Scholastic medals: a 2023 Scholastic National Silver Medal Poetry; Regional Gold Key Poetry, and



Playwriting Regional Silver Key Playwriting, Film. She was also the 2021 Winner for The Dorset Theater Young Playwrights Festival.

Maya Jones (South Burlington High School)

Maya founded the SBHS Black Student Union in her junior year which became a space for black and brown students and supporters to address issues of both institutional racism and systemic advocacy. Maya also made some changes to the student tour guide program, making it much more student friendly. Reminding us how crucial lunch is for students, she now makes sure new students have access to peer groups at lunch and includes information about the school's affinity spaces for students of color. She has been a mentor and leader on the dance team, working with younger participants on learning routines and team building. She is currently enrolled in a Holocaust Studies course, AP Environmental Studies and AP Psychology, all of which are challenging. As a senior, she now reads the announcements to the school daily, is a 3-season athlete and an elected leader on Student Council. Maya reached her goal GPA and manages to make meaningful connections with adults and students every day. Her work now involves mentoring younger students in the work of social justice advocacy, a legacy that will live on.

Myles Lahue (Burr and Burton Academy)

Myles consistently demonstrates responsible citizenship through active involvement with his church's youth group and BBA's nationally recognized Unified program where he serves as a Partner on the Unified Basketball team and participates in Unified Drum Circle. The Unified basketball team unites athletes with special needs and partners in a collaborative environment that champions inclusivity and embraces the participation of individuals, regardless of their skills. The Unified Drum Circle is another unique opportunity to impact the school community and help students with mental disabilities. He also serves outside of school as an Assistant Coach for the Northshire Special Olympics Soccer Team. Myles was recognized as an AP Scholar in 2023, made the Headmaster's list (all As) for the past 3 years, and won the Bill Nye Science Award from STEM Organization of America for an innovative science project. He showcases his creativity by employing unconventional storytelling methods, such as composing original music for a Greek mythology story, utilizing various poems to critique a book, and even creating a podcast and interviewing a friend to understand their story. He conducted an experiment on the effect of high molarity solutions on the change in potato mass which led him to explore practical applications in the food industry, offering insights into methods for creating low-fat French fries and extending the shelf life of fresh produce.

Molly Luikart (The Long Trail School)

Molly stands out as an extraordinary natural athlete, consistently propelling Long Trail's varsity soccer and basketball teams to success over several seasons. Her impact on her small school's sports legacy is undeniable, earning her a well-deserved place among the best players in its history. Molly's prowess has translated into multiple post-season awards and recognition, particularly notable as the basketball team remains undefeated. Beyond her exceptional athletic abilities, Molly emerges as a remarkable leader. Having served as captain for both the soccer and basketball teams, she leads by example, employing both words and actions to inspire confidence in her teammates. This leadership extends far beyond the athletic fields, as evidenced by her role as the president of the ambassador club – an esteemed position. Molly's commitment to community service is commendable. Actively involved in UNICEF, the Do Something Club, and the Social Justice Club, she exemplifies an engaged and socially conscious citizen. Academically, Molly's cumulative GPA is not only the highest in her class but also among the best in the school's history. In essence, Molly embodies the spirit of a Long Trail student, excelling not only in sports and academics but also in leadership and community engagement.

Peyton Metruk (Bellows Free Academy Fairfax)

Since middle school Peyton has volunteered in elementary school classrooms, building relationships with both students and teachers. In high school she joined a small mentoring program which partnered high school students with elementary school buddies as mentors, and at the end of her sophomore year she was selected

To do this she introduced the first ever mentor retreat this year through a partnership with an organization called DREAM. Peyton participated in the MathWorks Math Modeling Challenging (or M3 Challenge), a national event in which each team has 14 hours to work through a real-world math challenge. She worked with a group of students that are on an advisory committee for the VPA to develop two different presentations, one about sportsmanship in high school athletics and in the other about the history and impacts of Title IV in athletics.
