

- Total of 638 so far








Vermont EPP Graduates Issued an Initial License




Alternative Route Completers



State Investments \$3.45m

- •\$2.5 Million <u>Vermont Teacher Loan Forgivable Loan Program</u>
 - VT Legislature, managed by VSAC
 - All funds committed
 - 208 individuals were awarded funds
 - 214 applied after funds exhausted
- •\$500,000 Emerging Pathways Grant Program
 - VT Legislature, managed by AOE EQ division
 - 6 applicants applied, all awarded partial funding. Finalizing grant agreements
- •\$200,000 VREC Apprenticeship project planning
 - Significant program management work across the state with EPPs and Districts
 - 28 Apprentices will participate in Peer Review Pilot this School year
 - Conversations continuing with various IHE's on all models of apprenticeships
- •\$250,000 NEA Peer Review Support Program
 - VT Leg was about to pass \$400,000 from GF, AOE committed ARP-ESSER and bid
 - 176 have been supported through this program over the past 2 years



2022 Paraeducator Survey

- •226 respondents (Sample size of 8.5% off 2675 statewide paras)
- •75% of paraeducators live in their district of employment
- •52% of those paraeducators are somewhat or extremely interested in becoming a licensed teacher
- •We estimate:
 - 550+ Paraeducators with BA
 - 350+ with Associate's
 - 650+ with HS diploma/GED
- •Of all interested educators, 53% cited "positive experiences" in the classroom as their primary motivator to become a teacher, 38% cited salary increases or cost of living as primary motivation.



Interest and Instructional Level



Barriers for ESPs

- Average age of respondents 42
- •Of those not interested in becoming a teacher:
 - 46% cited student debt or cost/difficulty/length of current licensure pathways as the #1 reason they are not interested.
 - 35% indicated hours of current position were advantageous for other life circumstances
 - 18% are interested in other careers
- •Preference for Online vs. in-person was about 50/50
