3. Commendations: Laraway School had a clean and organized kitchen, and food service staff have a great rapport with the students. There was a great variety of hot and cold options at breakfast. Production records indicated the fruit and milk components were not served during the review period. Crediting documentation was not maintained on file as required. The State agency observed multiple repeat findings including insufficient quantities, whole-grains, fluid milk type and vegetable subgroup. The main entrée offered at lunch on the day of review did not provide enough



grain component to meet meal pattern requirements for the K-8 and 9-12

age/grade groups, the bean/pea/legume vegetable subgroup was not offered during the review period, grains offered during the day of review and review period did not meet whole-grain rich requirements, fluid milk was not offered in two varieties at breakfast and lunch on the day of review, and an unallowable milk type (unflavored 2%) was offered at breakfast and lunch during the review period.
