

Implementing High School Priority Performance Indicators in the Arts

Purpose

This document illustrates suggestions for the practical implementation of the <u>Arts Proficiency-Based Graduation Hierarchy</u> within specific content areas. It is not designed to prescribe specific content or instructional methods to educators but rather to provide insights into how the hierarchy can be realized in practice.

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Dance

Priority Performance Indicator	Ideas for Realized Practice
Generate and Conceptualize: Students generate and transform concepts into artistic expression through the use of the creative process. This involves exploring movement possibilities, experimenting with choreographic ideas, and translating abstract concepts into physical expressions. Activities: Movement Exploration: Encourage students to explore different movements, making shapes with the body, and spatial patterns. Improvisational Exercises: Provide opportunities for students to improvise and generate movement spontaneously, fostering creativity. Choreographic Workshops: Guide students through choreographic workshops where they can conceptualize and structure dance sequences.
Organize, Develop, and Complete: Students plan, organize, and develop ideas into artistic expression by using different materials, concepts, and/or media to complete a final piece.	 Once concepts are generated, students can plan, organize, and develop these ideas into a cohesive dance piece. This involves selecting appropriate movements, arranging sequences, and refining the choreography to create a final performance. Activities: Choreography Planning: Guide students in creating a plan for their dance piece, considering elements like spacing, timing, and thematic coherence. Rehearsals: Conduct rehearsals where students can develop and refine their movements, ensuring a polished and well-organized final piece. Performance Showcase: Provide opportunities for students to present their completed dance works to an audience.
