

## Discussion Questions and Activities for *Molly of Denali*

### *“Berry Itchy Day”*

#### *Before Viewing*

- What do you predict the story will be about? Why?
- What berries do you think Molly and her family like to eat?
- What kind of bugs do you see when you go picking berries?

#### *During Viewing*

- Did the story plot match your predictions?
- What mistake did Molly make before they went on the trip? What happened as a result of this mistake?
- Why did the fire keep mosquitoes away?

#### *After Viewing*

- What was the problem Molly and her family encountered on their trip? What strategies did Molly use to try to solve the problem? Which ones were successful?
- How did Molly's friend find the recipe in the book?
- What ingredients did Molly and her mom use in the recipe? What steps did Molly and her mom take to make the recipe?
- What useful text features can you use to help you find what you are looking for inside informational books?

**Writing Connection Activity:** See if you can find some wild plants at or near your home. Draw a picture of the plants you find. Do some research about the plants and write a short summary about what you learned.

### *“Herring Eggs or Bust”*

#### *Before Viewing*

- What do you predict the story will be about? Why?
- What are herring eggs? Have you ever tried herring eggs?

### *During Viewing*

- Did the story plot match your predictions?
- Why did Molly need 3 good reasons to go on her adventure?
- What do you think might be Molly's 3rd good reason?

### *After Viewing*

- What obstacle did Molly face when trying to find 3 good reasons to embark on her adventure?  
How did she finally find 3 good reasons?
- How did Molly organize her reasons?
- Which of Molly's reasons were acceptable and which ones were not? Why?

**Writing Connection Activity/Writing opinion/arguments:** Think of something you would really like to do or a place you would really like to visit. See if you can construct an argument to persuade your family to let you. Try to think of three or more good reasons.
